3. Complaints Handling and Enforcement Program Office/Division /Unit in charge: Legal and Enforcement Program	The beneficiaries of this program are the data subjects and/or complainants.	The NPC, with its quasi-judicial power, is authorized to address complaints and institute investigations in relation to violations of the DPA and other issuances of the Commission, including violations of the rights of data subjects and other matters affecting personal data and security breaches. This subprogram is also anchored to the Philippine Development Plan 2023-2028 where the NPC pursues a fair, consistent, and efficient approach in the handling of complaints of violations of personal data privacy and security, among others. The program seeks to ensure the continued protection of every male and female data subject's personal information by making their right to file a complaint easier to exercise and less costly.	For the last quarter of FY 2023, the Complaints and Investigation Division (CID) 100% acted upon all privacy concerns received totaling to 2,819 comprised of 2,488 e-mails (88%), 265 phone calls/messages (9%), and 66 walk-ins (3%) with a total cumulative data of 11,557 privacy concerns received and acted upon from January to December 2023. Other significant accomplishments as of 31 December 2023 were as follows: a. The CID received 202 complaints through walk-in or electronic mail.
